We are pleased to submit the *Enloe Medical Center 2011 Community Benefit Update* to the California Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development.





Commitment to Improve Community Health

Enloe's Community Benefits efforts are based on identified needs from our community needs assessment. Our most recent assessment was conducted in September 2010.

The following is an update of our efforts:

- Continued growth and support of the Hospitalist Program at Enloe Medical Center, a program that provides hospital care to community members who either do not have a primary care physician or whose physician does not offer hospital oversight to their patients.
- Presented over 12 free Health & Wellness Public Lectures by physicians and other health care professionals on vital health care issues.
- Successfully accomplished Enloe's Annual Community Health Fair.
- Successfully accomplished Enloe's Diabetes Alert Day Program.
- Successfully accomplished month-long educational focus on Heart Health.
- Planning a free drop-in clinic offering blood-pressure screenings, weigh-ins and information on nutrition, fitness, smoking cessation and stress reduction.
- Continued sponsorship and major support of the following key community collaborations:
 - The Growing Healthy Children Fun Run
 - The 2010 Columbus Avenue Neighborhood Health & Safety Fair
 - The Drop the Drugs Campaign
 - The Community Campaign to Prevent Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Disorders
 - Butte County Meth Strike Force & Coalition for Drug Abuse Prevention

In addition to these identified goals, Enloe also provides community benefits in several other areas, as described in this report.

A Commitment to Community Building: Physician Recruitment, Healthy Partnerships

Enloe Medical Center is proud of our nearly 100 years of service to the communities of Northern California. As we work to ensure that the people of the North Valley continue to receive excellent health care, we are mindful of the shortage of physicians nationwide and in California. The need for physicians becomes imperative, as the City of Chico has grown to over 33 square miles with a population of 86,900 in the incorporated area and a population of approximately 100,000 in the greater urban area.

Enloe Medical Center dedicated resources toward recruiting physicians to our region. In fiscal year 2011, **we allocated \$690,000 in the recruitment of physicians needed in the area.**



With this investment, **12 new physicians** joined our community during the fiscal year.

- **1 Hospitalist**
- **2 Nephrologists**
- **1 Radiologist**
- **1 Anesthesiologist**
- **1 Obstetrician/Gynecologist**

Additionally, Enloe spent \$20,216 in other community-building activities provided by our partners. These partners provide activities that build a stronger community in health, education, job growth and economic development: American Red Cross, Chico Chamber of Commerce, Chico Economic Planning Corporation, Chico Elks Lodge, Chico Performances, CSU Chico Foundation, North Valley Community Foundation, Tri County Economic Forecast Conference, University Public Events and Yuba Sutter Regional Arts Council.

Gastroenterology

Certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine, Dr. Uzma Abbasi completed both her fellowship in Gastroenterology and residency in Internal Medicine at the Harlem Hospital Center in New York, where she was recognized as the top member of her class each year.

Of her decision to leave New York City for Chico, she explains, “I grew up in a small community in Pakistan, and I really like the atmosphere here.” When she and her husband visited Chico, she said, “the community felt perfect. At Enloe, I liked everyone I met.”

Endoscopic ultrasonography had not been offered in Chico until Dr. Abbasi’s arrival. Dr. Abbasi performs endoscopies at Enloe Medical Center.



Planetree Updates

Enloe expands patient-centered care

Enloe Medical Center's Board of Trustees and administration support employees and volunteers in creating a partnership that personalizes, humanizes and demystifies the health care experience for patients and families. Employees and volunteers continue to be oriented to this philosophy at new hire orientation and annual training retreats. **1,630 individuals attended a four-hour training retreat during this fiscal year.**

As a Planetree affiliate, Enloe continues to make strides in identifying, developing and implementing patient-centered care initiatives in a healing environment. This past fiscal year, our Planetree program has embarked on the following initiatives:

A Care Ambassador Program, created by Enloe Volunteer Services, reduces the physical, psychological, social and spiritual anxiety of patients and their families. Patient ambassadors are compassionate volunteers who receive in-depth training and orientation. They visit hospital patients, engaging in conversation, reading, playing cards, offering a caring touch and providing access to healing arts. The program recently launched a Caring for You Cart, which offers guests light refreshments, diversions and comfort items, all free of charge. The Care Ambassador Program also fosters a sense of community involvement by providing community members an opportunity to donate to the cart or help serve.

A Shared Medical Record, now available at Enloe Medical Center, enables patients to review their own medical record during their stay at the hospital. This is a collaborative experience with a nurse or physician reviewing the record with the patient via bedside computer or a paper record. Medical terminology is often a language of its own, and the Shared Medical Record promotes a two-way dialogue between patients and health care providers to help ensure that the information is understood. Patients are empowered to ask questions about their disease and their course of treatment. Patients can also authorize their loved ones to review their medical records, with written permission.

Planetree Updates

Since 2008, Enloe Medical Center's **Sustainability Task Force** has continued to expand our recycling and ecologically sustainable practices. Our latest effort was the installation of new eco-friendly sharps containers throughout the medical center in February 2011. The medical center switched from disposable to reusable containers for all used medical needles and other sharp medical instruments. The new containers are collected and taken to a treatment facility where they are emptied, sanitized, inspected and then returned to the hospital ready for use. Phasing out the disposable containers helps prevent thousands of pounds of plastic and corrugated material from accumulating in landfills and reduces carbon emissions. The new containers are also safer for caregivers thanks to its drop-in top, which helps prevent needle sticks.

In addition, Enloe has continued with the ongoing programs established by our Sustainability Task force, including the recycling of:

- Batteries
- Fluorescent lights
- Cardboard
- Plastic
- Aluminum
- Glass
- Office supplies
- Medical equipment (Project S.A.V.E.)
- Computers (Computers for Classrooms)

Other ongoing sustainability efforts at Enloe include a commute-to-work program that provides transit subsidies, bicycle parking and a guaranteed ride home for employees who use alternative transportation.

Enloe completed its first **Five Wishes** campaign during the fiscal year, together with community partner PASSAGES. Five Wishes is a living will, which helps ensure that a person's final wishes are carried out. A living will can also provide family and friends with the comfort of knowing how to act in their loved one's best interest. A partnership between Enloe Medical Center and PASSAGES – a local organization offering services and programs to help caregivers and older adults – aims to help local residents express their personal, emotional, and spiritual needs and medical wishes via a simple form called Five Wishes. The form also ensures that someone's living will is in compliance with state laws.

Five Wishes Community Campaign's accomplishments for fiscal year 2011:

- As part of our collaborative Five Wishes Community Campaign, Enloe and PASSAGES completed 37 workshops for houses of worship and social organizations. This educated 3,540 community members about the types of discussions needed when completing the Five Wishes Living Will.
- Enloe printed and distributed 6,000 free copies of the Five Wishes form to community members.


The Five Wishes form identifies:

- The person you want to make care decisions for you when you can't
- The kind of medical treatment you want or don't want
- How comfortable you want to be
- How you want people to treat you
- What you want your loved one to know

Five Wishes was created in 1997 by Aging with Dignity, a national non-profit organization with a mission to affirm and safeguard the human dignity of individuals as they age and to promote better care for those near the end of life and are unable to speak for themselves.

Enloe's Sustainability Facts for FY2011

- **More than 5,000 pounds** of plastic, aluminum and glass were collected at our Enloe campuses.
- **320 students were served** through Enloe's donations to Computers for Classrooms.
- **Sixty-four 20-foot containers** of surplus medical supplies and equipment have been sent to locations around the world through a collaborative effort with Project S.A.V.E. (Salvage All Valuable Equipment), an organization that recycles left-over medical supplies and equipment for third-world clinics.

3,889 community members participated in 12 free community health fairs. Enloe hosted four of the fairs and partnered with local organization in eight. At the health fairs we provided health education; screenings for diabetes, stroke, hypertension, hyperlipidemia, tuberculosis and pulmonary function; as well as aerobic capacity testing.

976 community members received taxi vouchers upon discharge.

934 community members participated in our free parenting series for new parents and babies age 0-3 months.

832 community members at community groups, service clubs, university classes and assisted-living facilities attended talks and lectures presented by health care professionals.

787 community members received physician referrals via our new physician referral line.

Our free physician referral line, launched in April 2010, helps community members locate a doctor with the expertise and location that suits their needs. Service advisors make a referral based on the type of doctor requested and follow up by mail. Our Find a Doctor online directory, which launched in December 2010, provides an additional way to search for a doctor - by name, specialty or health-related keyword.

422 community members were served at our Health Learning Center and Cancer Center Library.

298 community members participated in our many support programs. Some of these groups were formed through partnerships with community organizations.

Community Health Education Through Media



100,418 community members are educated on health issues through our media publications and communications.

We received a Bronze Award from the Healthcare Public Relations and Marketing Association (HPRMA) in April 2011 for our Heart Heroes TV commercial featuring heart patient and Division Fire Chief, Steve Simpson. There was not a silver or gold given in this category, Enloe received the highest honor.

We received a 2011 MeritHealthcare Advertising Award from the *Healthcare Marketing Report* for our website. The national competition for the well-respected annual Health Care Advertising Awards began 28 years ago. A national panel of judges reviewed the entries based on creativity, quality, message effectiveness, consumer appeal, graphic design and overall impact.



Advancing health care through learning

Enloe provided 24,953 teaching hours for 3,483 students.

- **275 students were served** through coordinated efforts with educational facilities throughout the west coast. The Enloe Rehabilitation provided the mandatory clinical setting and oversight for occupational therapy, physical therapy, and speech therapy students.
- **380 students were served** through internships, educational mentoring, job shadowing and career education assistance.
- **2,359 students were served** through coordinated efforts with Butte Community College, California State University Chico School of Nursing and Feather River Hospital. Enloe provided undergraduate/vocational training to RN, LVN and CNA students.
- **4 students were served** through coordinated efforts with outside organizations. Enloe provided undergraduate training and instruction of dietitians, pharmacists, respiratory therapist, paramedics, emergency medical technicians and other health professionals.
- **465 professionals were served** through training for fire departments, police departments, ambulance services, and the Butte County Interagency Rescue in the local and surrounding areas.



Meeting the training needs for health care personnel in the Northern California region

1,798 students received simulation training in fiscal year 2011 at the Rural Northern California Clinical Simulation Center, or SimCenter, located inside Enloe's Cohasset Campus. The SimCenter was established by the California State University, Chico School of Nursing in partnership with Enloe Medical Center and Feather River Hospital. The center is one of 10 simulation centers worldwide to be accredited by the Society for Simulation in Healthcare in the area of education and teaching.

Simulation centers can help increase safety for patients by improving team communication and the time it takes for nurses to respond in critical events. Many health event scenarios can be practiced and refined, with no harm or inconvenience to real patients.

STEMI Symposium

On Sept. 28, 2010, Enloe Medical Center hosted its first STEMI (ST-Elevation Myocardial Infarction) Symposium, increasing awareness of cardiac-related care and highlighting Enloe's recent designation as a STEMI Receiving Center (the first hospital from the greater Sacramento area to the Oregon border to be designated as a STEMI Receiving Center).

More than 200 clinicians and practitioners from Northern California attended to receive education about the treatment of the STEMI heart attack and what it means to be a STEMI Receiving Center.

Promising Partnership

A New Vision in Enloe's Cancer Services



Enloe Medical Center and the UCSF Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center have formed an affiliation of cancer programs. This affiliation will enhance patient care, increase cancer disease prevention, and expand access to high-quality, specialty treatment for residents throughout Northern California served by the Enloe Regional Cancer Center's outpatient services, Enloe's inpatient oncology unit, and Enloe Hospice.

UCSF Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center

UCSF is a leading university dedicated to promoting health worldwide through advanced biomedical research, graduate-level education in the life sciences and health professions, and excellence in patient care. The UCSF Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center was designated as a Comprehensive Cancer Center by the National Cancer Institute in 1999 in recognition of the highest level of excellence in both its scientific research and its ability to integrate diverse research approaches to focus on the problem of cancer and improve patient outcomes.

The aims of the relationship:

- Provide Enloe's medical staff with current information on UCSF's clinical research trials.
- Expedite process for patients to be seen at UCSF and enter into trials.
- Joint tumor boards in which a multidisciplinary group of doctors will review and discuss, via videoconferencing, patient conditions and treatment options.
- Develop annual educational sessions on cancer prevention and treatment for physicians, allied health professionals, cancer survivors and local individuals.
- Build a valuable survivorship program.

Enloe Medical Center's Cancer Services provides comprehensive support from diagnosis, through treatment and follow-up care. Over the last fiscal year more than **800 individuals were treated for newly diagnosed cancers**. Enloe recognizes the impact cancer has on its community members and is committed to building a meaningful program that offers patients and their family and friends the information and support they need.

- Brighter Days: Bringing hope and comfort to those in chemotherapy or radiation treatment by maximizing the health of one's skin, hair and nails.

- Man-to-Man Prostate Cancer Support Group and Education, in association with the American Cancer Society: Education for men newly diagnosed or with questions.
- Multiple Myeloma Support Group: For patients and caregivers.
- Telling Our Stories: Writing group for learning about writing to heal.
- VIVA! For youth living with loved ones with cancer.
- Women's Cancer Support Group: For women in treatment and survivors.
- Tough Enough to Wear Pink Fundraiser: Diamond W National Bull-riding Championships.
- Enloe's Think Pink Celebration & Healing Art Reception: A Celebration of the work of cancer survivors and the Lilly Oncology on Canvas exhibition.
- Enloe's Breast Cancer Awareness Luncheon: A discussion of treatment options and patient experiences.
- Promotion of Operation Mammogram: A free mammography clinic held at North State Imaging for women over 40 who do not have insurance.
- Enloe's Survivorship Picnic Brunch Celebration: A salute to all cancer patient and survivors, educational booths, networking, activities, crafts and food.





Enloe Ambulance and the Community

The Enloe Ambulance paramedics and emergency medical technicians play an important role in our community. Their primary responsibility is the critical job of responding to 911 calls and providing emergency medical services outside of the hospital. Enloe Ambulance collaborates with other ambulance services to extend coverage in Butte, Glenn, Tehama and Colusa Counties.

As a nonprofit emergency medical system, Enloe Ambulance is able to develop unique programs that benefit the community.

Enloe Ambulance:

- Has the only bariatric ambulance in the region.
- Supports Butte College paramedic and EMT student interns by allowing them to ride along at no cost.
- Helps Home Economic Related Occupations (HERO) students and Regional Occupational Program (ROP) students consider a career options by allowing them to ride.
- Provides on-site medic support for area nonprofit events like Relay for Life.
- Partners with the California Highway Patrol, City of Chico Police and Fire and other agencies to educate high school students about the dangers of drinking and driving through the “Every 15 Minutes” program.
- Offers child-focused health education at local organizations and events.

This year Enloe Ambulance served 6,130 community members through the “Every 15 Minutes” program, ambulance demonstrations, safety talks, and emergency medical services at public events.

Organ Donation

In 2010, Enloe received the **Health Resources and Service Administration (HRSA) Medal of Honor** from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for the fifth consecutive year. This award recognizes Enloe’s efforts in increasing organ donation to patients awaiting transplants

Currently, in California more than 21,000 individuals are awaiting a transplant, over 120 in Butte County alone. Just one organ donor can save up to eight lives and one tissue donor can improve the lives of up to 50 others.

To help these individuals in need, Enloe Medical Center also partnered with the California Transplant Donor Network (CTDN), a non-profit organ recovery agency serving central and northern California. In 2010, we held an internal eCampaign to inspire our caregivers to register as organ and tissue donors on the Donate Life California Donor Registry. 125 people registered as potential organ and tissue donors. This is a powerful example of the compassion and generosity displayed by the Enloe community every day. Our results were so extraordinary that CTDN staff is considering using Enloe as a case study to encourage other hospitals and medical centers to launch an eCampaign.




Century Project Update

The Enloe Century Project will transform Enloe Medical Center, doubling its size, to provide a more comfortable environment to care for the people of our community for generations to come. The project also helps Enloe to meet California's new seismic requirements. The project consists of a new patient tower and surgery center, a parking structure that was completed earlier, the expansion of Enloe's emergency department and the development of a park.

The Magnolia Tower, a five-story patient building will open in 2012. It will feature:

- Two new Intensive Care Units with 12 beds each for cardiovascular and neuro-trauma patients
- The Nettleton Mother & Baby Care Center, offering private rooms with private bathrooms
- New main entrance with a reception area, lounge, garden café, gift shop and meditation room
- A comfortable family lounge with refreshment area on each upper floor
- Separate elevators for patients and the public, enhancing patient privacy and comfort
- New Surgery Center with double the number of existing surgery suites
- Dedicated heart, neurological and orthopedic operating rooms
- Two private surgery consultation rooms for physicians to meet with patients and families
- Landscaping that includes an eco-friendly irrigation system and native plants that require less water
