Borrowers' Compliance with their Community Service Obligations

For the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2008

Reason for the Report - Health and Safety Code Citation

As required by Health and Safety Code Section 129075 (c), the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development (**OSHPD**) "shall annually report to the Legislature the extent of borrowers' compliance with their community service obligations, pursuant to Section 129050 subdivision (j), Section 129055, and Section 129065." (See **Exhibit I**.)

These sections contain the following criteria for community service obligations:

- To be eligible for insurance, the health facility will be available to all persons residing or employed in the area served.
- If the borrower is a hospital, skilled nursing facility, or clinic, it shall treat a reasonable proportion of Medi-Cal and Medicare patients.
- To assure availability of services to all persons, any hospital agrees to:
 - Advise patients about Medi-Cal and Medicare eligibility.
 - Distribute a list of physicians who have privileges at the hospital.
 - Advise their medical staff of the hospital's commitment to treat Medi-Cal and Medicare patients.
 - Post notices about their community service obligation.

This is the ninth report, as required by this statute.

Background

Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development

Created in 1977, OSHPD plans and develops innovative healthcare policies and programs to support the interests of government, consumers, and the healthcare industry.

OSHPD's staff oversee a number of diverse programs. OSHPD serves as the building department for all hospitals and nursing homes in the state. Its primary goal is to ensure that patients in these facilities are safe and that facilities remain functional in the event of an earthquake or other natural disaster.

OSHPD supports the training of health professionals, especially doctors and nurses who provide primary care services and are willing to practice their profession in underserved communities. Support includes direct subsidies to medical schools and nursing programs, as well as scholarships and educational loan repayment for individual students.

OSHPD collects, analyzes, and disseminates information about hospitals, nursing homes, clinics, and home health agencies licensed in California. The information includes financial reports from hospitals and data on the use of services and quality of care provided.

Cal-Mortgage Loan Insurance Division

OSHPD, through its Cal-Mortgage Loan Insurance Division, provides loan insurance to nonprofit and public health facilities, especially those in underserved communities, to help them develop or expand access to needed services.

California Health Facility Construction Loan Insurance Program

Modeled after federal home mortgage programs, the California Health Facility Construction Loan Insurance Program (**Program**) has made it possible for nonprofit and public healthcare facilities to obtain private financing without cost to taxpayers to develop or expand their services in communities throughout California. Without such a guarantee, many of these facilities simply could not arrange the financing required to serve their communities.

Created in 1969, the California Health Facility Construction Loan Insurance Program insures loans for construction and renovation projects that improve access to needed healthcare. OSHPD can insure loans to nonprofit public benefit corporations or public entities (cities, counties, hospital districts, or joint power authorities) in which the State of California guarantees the payments of principal and interest on the loans. The loan insurance permits borrowers to obtain low interest rates, similar to the rates available to the State of California, and allows access to lower tax-exempt bond interest rates. The Program is currently authorized to insure up to \$3.0 billion for health facility projects.

As of June 30, 2008, OSHPD insured 137 loans, totaling \$1.4 billion.

In assessing the need for a particular project, Cal-Mortgage staff review various factors, such as the type of services provided, the utilization of existing services, the future demand for services, and the level of community support. The extent

to which a project provides needed services to its community is balanced with a credit analysis to assure that the borrower can repay the loan and that loan insurance can be issued without future cost to the State. Another aspect of the project analysis is the applicant's performance compared to the community service obligation criteria.

In conjunction with ongoing monitoring of financial performance of borrowers, Cal-Mortgage staff review additional information to determine that existing borrowers are continuing to meet their community service obligation.

Summary

OSHPD has determined that all borrowers were in compliance with their community service obligations. No plans of correction were needed for the FY 2007-08 reporting period, as specified in Section 129075 (b).

The following sections of the report describe how Cal-Mortgage staff:

- (1) review loan applications for eligibility as it pertains to availability of services, as stated in Health and Safety Code Section 129050 (j);
- (2) monitor borrowers for provision of services to Medi-Cal and Medicare patients, as stated in Health and Safety Code Section 129055; and
- (3) assure that hospitals comply with the community service obligation, as stated in Health and Safety Code Section 129065.

Review to Assure that Services are Available (Section 129050(j))

Health and Safety Code Section 129050 (j) requires that in order for a loan to be eligible for insurance, the borrower shall offer reasonable assurance that the services of the health facility will be available to all persons residing or employed in the area served by the facility. (See **Exhibit I.**)

New Applicants

Exhibit II shows the eight new insured loans during FY 2007-08. There were two new borrowers (Hill Country Community Clinic and Family Healthcare Network). Within the insurance application to OSHPD, each new borrower provided assurances that their services are available to all persons residing or employed in the area served by the project, depending on the medical needs of the patient. During the due diligence review, Cal-Mortgage staff evaluated those assurances. This information was included in the Project Summary & Financial Analysis that was submitted to the Advisory Loan Insurance Committee (**ALIC**) and the OSHPD director. ALIC reviewed the submitted material and recommended approval of the proposed project to the OSHPD director. The

OSHPD director reviewed the Cal-Mortgage staff and ALIC recommendations prior to approving the request for loan insurance.

Current Borrowers

As part of the on-going monitoring of projects, Cal-Mortgage staff conduct site visits. During FY 2007-08, 114 site visits were conducted. No situations of discriminatory practices were observed during these visits.

In addition, Cal-Mortgage staff maintain constant contact, via periodic meetings, with the Departments of Health Care Services, Public Health, Alcohol and Drug Programs, and other State agencies. Through these efforts, Cal-Mortgage staff monitor for licensing deficiencies, including findings of discriminatory practices by borrowers. During the past year, there were no reports of this nature brought to the attention of Cal-Mortgage staff regarding any of the insured projects.

Review to Assure that Services are Provided to Medi-Cal and Medicare Patients (Section 129055)

Hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and primary care clinics are those facilities that are certified for reimbursement for cost of care under Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 14000) of Part 3 of Division 9 of the Welfare and Institutions Code (Medi-Cal) and Title XVIII of the federal Social Security Act (Medicare). These types of projects must comply with Health and Safety Code Section 129055 and demonstrate that the facility is used by persons for whom the cost of care is reimbursed by Medi-Cal and Medicare, in a proportion that is reasonable based upon the proportion of Medi-Cal and Medicare patients in the community served by the borrower. (See **Exhibit I.**)

New Applicants

The two new borrowers shown on **Exhibit II** are primary care clinics. Within the loan insurance application to OSHPD, each borrower provided data about the proportions of Medi-Cal and Medicare utilization. As described in the prior section related to Health and Safety Code Section 129050 (j), Cal-Mortgage staff used the same due diligence to validate the information and the same process was used by the Advisory Loan Insurance Committee (**ALIC**) and the OSHPD director of to approve the request for loan insurance.

Current Borrowers

Among current borrowers, there are 13 hospitals, 4 skilled nursing facilities, and 20 primary care clinics. The proportion of Medi-Cal and Medicare utilization for each borrower was calculated from OSHPD's Healthcare Information Division data reports, which are derived from mandatory reports from healthcare facilities. These utilization percentages were then compared to the percentage of Medi-Cal eligibles and Medicare beneficiaries in the county or service area of the borrower.

As done in previous years for this annual report, separate tables are prepared for Medi-Cal and Medicare utilization for hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and clinics. See **Exhibits IV and V**.

As in prior years with each grouping, there are some variances.

For some hospitals, the proportion of Medi-Cal eligibles in the service area surrounding the hospital is not appropriately reflected by the countywide percentage. In these cases, for the appropriate service area, ZIP codes were identified. Medi-Cal recipient data and population data were obtained. The percentage of Medi-Cal eligibles was calculated for this service area and then used in the comparison to the percent of services provided. See **Exhibit IV A**.

For skilled nursing facilities, Medicare benefits include a 60-day lifetime limit. Generally, it is expected that they will not have significant Medicare utilization. As a result, some insured skilled nursing facilities show low levels of Medicare utilization. See **Exhibit V B**.

For clinics, some provide services focused on Medi-Cal and uninsured populations. Services are primary care focused (immunizations, pediatrics, prenatal, and well-baby). Elderly, Medicare patients generally need specialty medical services and utilize community physicians. As a result, these clinics have a low level of Medicare utilization. See **Exhibit V C**.

In making a determination of non-compliance under Section 129055 and, thus, requiring a plan of compliance, as described in Section 129075 (b), for hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and clinics, both Medi-Cal and Medicare utilization were added together and compared to the proportion of Medi-Cal eligibles and Medicare beneficiaries in the county. See **Exhibits III A, B, & C**.

When Medicare and Medi-Cal utilization are combined, the review of the utilization of services at hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and primary care clinics demonstrates that borrowers were providing reasonable proportions of services to Medi-Cal eligibles and Medicare beneficiaries in their respective service areas.

Specific Requirement for Hospitals (Section 129065)

Health and Safety Code Section 129065 requires that hospitals shall (1) advise patients about eligibility, (2) distribute a list of physicians who have privileges at the hospital, (3) advise their medical staff of the hospital's commitment to treat Medi-Cal and Medicare patients, and (4) post notices about their community service obligation. See **Exhibit I**.

There are 13 general acute care hospitals in the loan portfolio. During routine site visits, Cal-Mortgage staff met with hospital administrators and observed hospital operations to validate that the hospital met the requirements of Section 129065. In addition, Cal-Mortgage staff has a letter of certification on file from each insured hospital project, stating that the hospital was fulfilling this community service obligation. **Exhibit VI A** is a list of all hospital projects. **Exhibit VI B** is a copy of a sample certification letter.

Based upon this review, all hospitals in the portfolio met this requirement of their community service obligation.

Conclusion

With reference to Health and Safety Code Section 129050 (j), all applicants for new loans in FY 2007-08 made reasonable assurances that their services are available to all persons in their service area, based on the medical needs of the patient. It was determined that all currently insured borrowers met their obligation to be available to all persons in their service area.

With reference to Health and Safety Code Section 129055, hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and clinics are the borrowers in the portfolio that provide services to Medi-Cal eligibles and Medicare beneficiaries. A review of utilization of services at each hospital, skilled nursing facility, and clinic project demonstrated that the borrower was providing a reasonable proportion of services to Medi-Cal eligibles and Medicare beneficiaries in the service area.

With reference to Health and Safety Code Section 129065, all hospitals in the portfolio provided proper notifications to their patients and medical staff relating to their community service obligation requirements.

OSHPD has determined that all borrowers were in compliance with their community service obligations.

Cal-Mortgage Borrowers' Compliance With their Community Service Obligations

Health and Safety Code Citations Sections 129050 (j), 129055, 129065, 129075 (b), and 129075 (c)

129050. A loan shall be eligible for insurance under this chapter if all of the following conditions are met:

(j) The borrower shall offer reasonable assurance that the services of the health facility will be made available to all persons residing or employed in the area served by the facility.

129055. In order to comply with subdivision (j) of Section 129050, any borrower that is certified for reimbursement for cost of care under Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 14000) of Part 3 of Division 9 of the Welfare and Institutions Code shall demonstrate that its facility is used by persons for whom the cost of care is reimbursed under that chapter, in a proportion that is reasonable based upon the proportion of Medi-Cal patients in the community served by the borrower and by persons for whom the costs of care is reimbursed under Title XVIII of the federal Social Security Act in a proportion that is reasonable based upon the proportion of Medicare patients in the community served by the borrower.

For the purposes of this chapter, the community means the service areas or patient populations for which the health facility provides health care services, unless the office determines that, or the borrower demonstrates to the satisfaction of the office that, a different definition is more appropriate for the borrower's facility.

129065. As part of its assurance under subdivision (j) of Section 129050, any borrower that is a general acute care hospital or acute psychiatric hospital shall agree to the following actions:

(a) To advise each person seeking services at the borrower's facility as to the person's potential eligibility for Medi-Cal and Medicare benefits or benefits from other governmental third party payers.

(b) To make available to the office and to any interested person a list of physicians with staff privileges at the borrower's facility, that includes:

- (1) Name.
- (2) Speciality.
- (3) Language spoken.
- (4) Whether [it] takes Medi-Cal and Medicare patients.
- (5) Business address and phone number.

(c) To inform in writing on a periodic basis all practitioners of the healing arts having staff privileges in the borrower's facility as to the existence of the facility's community service obligation. The required notice to practitioners shall contain a statement, as follows:

"This hospital has agreed to provide a community service and to accept Medi-Cal and Medicare patients. The administration and enforcement of this agreement is the responsibility of the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development and this facility."

(d) To post notices in the following form, that shall be multilingual where the borrower serves a multilingual community, in appropriate areas within the facility, including but not limited to, admissions offices, emergency rooms, and business offices:

NOTICE OF COMMUNITY SERVICE OBLIGATION

"This facility has agreed to make its services available to all persons residing or employed in this area. This facility is prohibited by law from discriminating against Medi-Cal and Medicare patients. Should you believe you may be eligible for Medi-Cal or Medicare, you should contact our business office (or designated person or office) for assistance in applying. You should also contact our business office (or designated person or office) if you are in need of a physician to provide you with services at this facility. If you believe that you have been refused services at this facility in violation of the community service obligation you should inform (designated person or office) and the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development."

The borrower shall provide copies of this notice for posting to all welfare offices in the county where the borrower's facility is located.

129075.

(b) If a report indicates noncompliance with subdivision (j) of Section 129050, Section 129055, or Section 129065, the office shall require the borrower to submit a plan detailing the steps and timetables the borrower will take to bring the facility into compliance.

(c) The office shall annually report to the Legislature the extent of the borrowers' compliance with their community service obligations pursuant to subdivision (j) of Section 129050, Section 129055, and Section 129065.
